



MISSION, VISION, & GOALS



WHAT WE DO

The Mission Statement of All Among Us Inc. is to offer secure transformative housing and supportive wraparound services to women who are struggling to achieve and maintain stable housing independence.

HOW WE DO IT

All Among Us has two foundational programs in accomplishing its mission, The Women's Care Center residential program and Crisis Direct Aid Services community outreach.

Women's Care Center - AAU partners with its ladies in residence through an intense, affirming, and transformative program of life skills improvement focused in ten key areas:

Recovery – women with addiction are active in their recovery each week. We partner with The Salvation Army, Grace and Peace, and local AA/NA for recovery.

Financial Literacy – women become accountable for personal finances including all current personal debt. Then AAU's ladies develop a realistic plan to pay down debt and assess funds available for transportation, housing, and medical needs.

Workforce Readiness – women gain meaningful employment and maintain employment for over six months.

Mental and Physical Health – women improve physical health, mental health, and quality of life factors by connecting to wraparound services, attending doctor appointments, adhering to recovery programs and medication regimens.

Life Skills – women maintain practical daily life skills and have at least two stable and healthy relationships.

Cultural Literacy – women know the interests, build relationships within community increase the value placed on diversity, and increase participation in society.

Trauma – women become involved in trauma informed counseling in order to alleviate symptoms of trauma and develop adequate coping strategies

Housing – women develop knowledge of housing costs, having a realistic assessment of funds necessary for housing and to secure housing

Transportation – women develop a realistic assessment of funds necessary for transportation. AAU's ladies are experts at navigating the public transportation system for recovery, medical appointments, work, visiting family, and shopping. Prior to purchasing a vehicle, the women are debt free.



Aftercare Program - All Among Us had four women graduate from the Women's Care Center in 2020. Our Aftercare Program provides support for them, and our other graduates, after they have launched from the program.

THE VISION

The Board of Directors of All Among Us designated three areas for growth and expansion in 2021. We were very deliberate in selecting meaningful and achievable goals, allowing us to be good stewards of the funds bestowed upon the agency.

Higher Profile in the Philanthropic Community

We are expanding the profile of the agency within the donor-advised and social-cause philanthropic community. Over the last year AAU has engaged approximately 40 agencies in the St. Louis and broader Missouri region. In 2021, All Among Us seeks to strengthen these relationships. Our executive director will develop a needs analysis to better determine which of these groups most closely identify with our mission and will be receptive to new funding applications.



Crisis Direct Aid Services

Our reactivated Crisis Direct Aid Program helps people with their most immediate needs during a personal crisis. These include, among other things, food, weather-appropriate clothing, and basic hygiene needs. This was one of the first services we offered when the agency began. We also plan to expand our corps of volunteers and partner agencies to better deliver this assistance.



Social Media Promotion

All Among Us is implementing a comprehensive new web strategy and multi-channel social media communications plan. We are working with Seafoam Media, a St. Louis-based digital marketing agency. This plan allows AAU to expand its message to new audiences, attracting volunteers, private donors, and outreach to social service agency leaders to develop programming partnerships.

PROGRAMS

Women's Care Center Program

The primary effort of All Among Us is the Women's Care Center (WCC) founded in 2018. This program operates in a building that was formerly the Zion Lutheran Church in Ferguson. WCC is live-in transformative housing for women experiencing intergenerational poverty, chronic and episodic homelessness, addiction, mental illness, domestic violence, and a variety of other trauma-centered issues.

The WCC serves a population dealing with depression, mental illness, and a history of substance abuse, factors which make it difficult to find protection in other shelters. While they are from diverse backgrounds, our clients are generally women of color. They represent a wide age range, from 25 to 65. They also represent all sorts of abilities, talents, and personal histories. We house up to eight single women at any one time, and up to twenty women annually.

Residents are accepted equally into the WCC based strictly on their willingness to make a positive change and their consistent participation in all appropriate programs.

Many women have made a brave decision and are escaping domestic violence, also known as intimate partner violence. In one recent year, 23,000 women, all victims of domestic violence in Missouri, were turned away due to a lack of shelter space.

Residents are at different stages to getting their lives on track. Long-time residents serve as examples and inspiration to newcomers.

Residents at WCC participate in several programs including how to manage life change, development of life skills, mental health services referrals, workforce readiness, health and wellness, financial literacy, arts and creative expression, housing assistance, and recovery.

Our staffing for WCC includes our executive director, a full-time care services manager, one evening person, two overnight personnel, and a weekend person.

Aftercare Program

All Among Us had four women graduate from the Women's Care Center in 2020. Our Aftercare Program provides support for them, and our other graduates, after they have launched from the program.

The graduates regularly visit the Women's Care Center for Bacon Breakfasts, accountability, financial literacy, recovery, friendship, and community.

They also benefit from our partner service providers, including the Salvation Army and BJC Behavioral Care. They learn to identify obstacles, develop their strengths and skills, and create and work toward new goals.



How All Among Us Was Affected & How We Responded

The work we do at All Among Us requires a great deal of face-to-face contact with wrap-around services. This was the very kind of interaction we had to curtail during 2020 because of the pandemic. It was necessary for us to protect clients, staff, and volunteers.





Many agencies were forced to close for months at a time. Our Women's Care Center, however, remained open. We accomplished this through doing an amazing job of sheltering in place. We maintained a firm commitment to the use of masks, gloves and hand sanitizer, as well as social

distancing. We also encouraged everyone to get vaccinations when they became available. We held financial literacy classes, recovery meetings, art therapy, psychiatric and counseling visits via Zoom.

And we remain Covid-19-free! We did not have a reported case among staff, clients, or volunteers, as well as any of our stakeholders.
